 He is now 6 feet tall, light complexion, and
 blue eyes. I know all about his age and
 description during the war because I kept
 the records and had to make out his
 description, age and c, about once a month,
 for about three years.

Ans. Int. 4, Yes, enlisted in Co. B, 20th Texas Cavalry,
 in 1862, in which he served about 1 year, at which time
 the company was dismounted and was known
 as Company B, 20th Texas Dismounted Cavalry, in
 which he served about a year and a half. After
 which time the company was consolidated with
 other companies and was then known as Co. D, 20th T. & A.

I do not know personally about his discharge but am satisfied he was honorably discharged. He was detailed to shop duty at Ft. Washita, A. T. and when our Company left there, he was left there in the shop. This was about two months before the surrender.

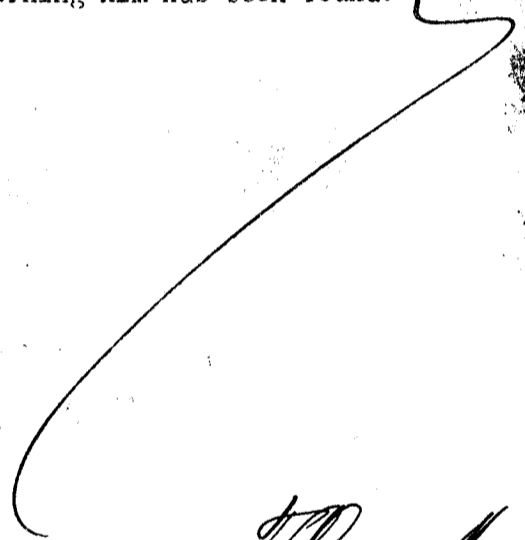
