### Widow's Application for Confederate Pension

THE STATE OF TEXAS,

County of Anderson

I, Mrs. Mary V. Wyatt do hereby make application to the Comptroller of Public Accounts for a pension, to be granted me under the Act passed by the Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Texas, and approved April 7, A. D. 1913, on the following grounds:

I am the widow of William H. Wyatt deceased, who departed this life on the 17th day of April, A. D. 1908, in the county of Leon in the State of

I have not remarried since the death of my said husband,\* and I do solemnly swear that I was never divorced from my said husband, and that I never voluntarily abandoned him during his life, but remained his true, faithful and lawful wife up to the date of his death. I was married to him on the 30th day of January, A. D. 1872, in the county of La Fayette in the State of Mississippi

My husband, the said William H. Wyatt, enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States, and that he did not desert the Confederate service. I have been a resident of the State of Texas since prior to January 1, A. D. 1910, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value above the sum of \$300.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does anyone hold in trust for my benefit or use, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the value of one thousand dollars, exclusive of the home of the value of not over \$2000; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, or from any other source, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

1. What is your age? 73 yrs
2. Where were you born? Oxford, Miss.
3. How long have you resided in the State of Texas? 38 yrs.
4. How long have you resided in the county of your present residence? 1 yr.
5. What is your postoffice address? 913 N. Turner Ave, Palestine, Tex
6. Did your husband draw a pension? no If so, give his file number
7. What is your husband's full name? William Wright Wyatt
8. In what State was your husband's command originally organized? Mississippi

9. How long did your husband serve? 4 yrs. If known to you, give date of enlistment and discharge Enlisted Apr. 26, 1861, Discharged March 29, 1865,

10. What was the name or letter of the company, or number of the regiment in which your husband served? If he was transferred from one branch of service to another, give time of transfer, description of command and time of service, (If applicant's husband was a pensioner give his file number, which is evidence sufficient for proof of service.) Co. G 11th Mississippi Regiment.

11. Name branch of service in which your husband served, whether infantry, cavalry, artillery, or the navy, or if commissioned as an officer by the President, his rank and line of duty, or if detailed for special service, under the law of conscription, the nature of such service, and time of service. Infantry

12. Have you transferred to another any property of any kind for the purpose of becoming a beneficiary under this law? no.

Wherefore your petitioner prays that her application for a pension may be approved and such other proceedings be had in the premises as required by law.

Dear Mrs. Trimble:

The records of this office show Mrs. Mary V. Wyatt, not shown as Mary V. Humphreys, executed an application for Confederate Pension on the service record of her deceased husband, William Wright Wyatt, on March 17, 1926 at Palestine, Anderson County, Texas.

Mrs. Wyatt stated at the time of filing application in March, 1926 that she was 73 years old. Date of birth is not shown. She was born in Oxford, Mississippi, but she had resided in Texas for 38 years.

Mrs. Wyatt shows in her application that she was married to William Wright Wyatt on January 30, 1872 in Lafayette, Mississippi. Mr. Wyatt's death occurred on April 17, 1908 in Leon County, Texas.

Mrs. Wyatt claimed her deceased husband served in Company G, 11th Mississippi Infantry, Confederate States Army. On this information this office requested a report on the service record of Mr. Wyatt from the office of the Adjutant General, War Department, Washington, D. C. The report follows:

"The records show that William W. Wyatt, Co. G, 11th Miss. Infantry, C. S. A. (Lamar Rifle), enlisted Feb. 23, 1861, at Oxford, Miss., mustered in to date May 13, 1861, at Lynchburg, Va. Muster roll Nov. & Dec. 1864, (the latest on file) shows him present, a private. Prisoner of War records show that he was captured April 2, 1865, at Hatcher's Run and released June 6, 1865, at Point Lookout, Md., on taking the Oath of Allegiance, a Private."

The Oath of Allegiance was taken by Mr. Wyatt after General Lee's surrender, which was April 9, 1865. The application for pension of Mrs. Wyatt was approved on the report from Washington and on affidavits of witnesses who had personal knowledge of the service. She drew a pension until her death until about April, 1926. No further information is given.

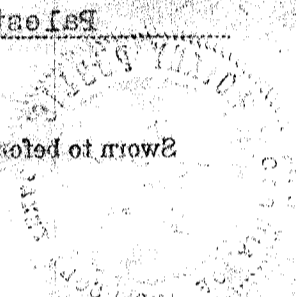
