Widow's Application for Confederate Pension

THE STATE OF TEXAS,

County of Anderson

I, Mrs. Ida (Day) Florey do hereby make application for a pension, pursuant to the provisions of the First Section of Title 109, Revised Civil Statutes, 1925, providing for Confederate Pension, amended by Chapter 95, General Laws of the Fortieth Legislature, as amended by Senate Bill 287, Acts of the Regular Session of the Forty-first Legislature of the State of Texas, approved March 5, 1929, on the following ground:

I am a widow of Laurence Day deceased, who departed this life on the 11 day of March, A. D. 1910, in the county of Rusk in the State of Texas

I have ~~not~~ remarried since the death of my said husband,* and I do solemnly swear that I was never divorced from my said husband, and that I never voluntarily abandoned him during his life, but remained his true, faithful and lawful wife up to the date of his death. I was married to him on the 30th day of May, A. D. 1888, in the county of Rusk in the State of Texas.

My husband, the said Laurence Day, enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States and he did not desert the Confederate service. I have been a resident of the State of Texas since prior to January 1, A. D. 1920, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value above the sum of \$300.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does anyone hold in trust for my benefit or use, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the value of one thousand dollars, exclusive of the home of the value of not over \$2000; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State of the United States, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

2. Where were you born? Camden, Ark.
3. How long have you resided in the State of Texas? 36 yrs.
4. How long have you resided in the county of your present residence? 3 yrs.
5. What is your postoffice address? 710 S. Magnolia St. Palestine, Tx
6. Have you applied for a pension under the Confederate pension law and been rejected? no

If rejected, state when and where.

7. Did your husband draw a pension? no If so, give his file number. He never applied. He had enough property to disqualify him.
8. Give, if possible, the postoffice address of your deceased husband at the time of his enlistment Werton, Texas. He enlisted at old Bellview, Rusk Co. Tx
9. What is your husband's full name? Laurence Day

10. In what State was your husband's command originally organized? Texas

11. How long did your husband serve? 2 yrs. If known to you, give date of enlistment and discharge Unknown

12. What was the name or letter of the company, or number of the regiment in which your husband served? If he was transferred from one branch of service to another, give time of transfer, description of command and time of service. (If applicant's husband was a pensioner give his file number, which is evidence sufficient for proof of service.) Enlisted under Capt. Mat Barton, at old Bellview, Rusk Co. He went to mobile, Ala. where he was discharged.

13. Name branch of service in which your husband served, whether infantry, cavalry, artillery, or the navy, or if commissioned as an officer by the President, his rank and line of duty, or if detailed for special service, under the law of conscription, the nature of such service, and time of service. He enlisted in cavalry, and later placed in infantry

14. Do you own any property other than that rendered for taxes in your county? If so, state value of same and county where located. Rusk County, Value

15. Have you transferred to another any property of any kind for the purpose of becoming a beneficiary under this law? no

Dear Mrs. Desmond:

Replying to your letter of December 1, 1937 in which you ask information in regard to forwarding or remailing the Confederate Pension Warrants of Mrs. Ida Day Florey.

You are advised that the State law requires that where Confederate Pensioners have removed from the address to which their warrants are mailed, it is the duty of the postmaster or postal clerks to return the warrants to the State Comptroller giving their reason for non-delivery.

It is also unlawful for any person other than the pensioner to open, cash, remail or forward these warrants when the pensioner has removed from the address given on the warrants. A partial quotation of this law is printed on all envelopes in which Confederate Pension Warrants are mailed.

I am asking that you please return Mrs. Ida Day Florey's warrant to this office, and furnish me with her present address.

Dear Mrs. Florey:

Your Confederate Pension Warrant for the Month of November, 1937 has been returned to this office by the Postmaster at Spring, Texas with a statement that your present address is as shown above.

The law of Texas requires Confederate Pensioners on leaving the State to notify this office of the exact date of leaving. However, pensioners are permitted, under the law, to temporarily leave Texas and remain for a period of not more than six months during which time their right as pensioners is not effected except that no warrants are issued during their absence.

If your return to Texas is within six months from the date of leaving the State then after your return back warrants will be issued to you for the time you have been absent. But if for any reason you should remain out of Texas longer than six months no warrants will be issued to you and your application will be canceled, unless you return and make application for reinstatement showing that during your absence you have not made or claimed any other state as your residence.

I am asking that you please at once furnish me the exact date you left the State of Texas, and if you should return to Texas within six months then you should notify this office of the exact date of your return.
