I, Mrs. Maggie D. Allen do hereby make application to the Comptroller of Public Accounts for a pension, to be granted me under the Act passed by the Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Texas, and approved April 7, A. D. 1913, on the following grounds:

I am the widow of J.S. Allen deceased, who departed this life on the November day of 1887, A. D. 1887, in the county of McLennan in the State of Texas

I have not remarried since the death of my said husband,* and I do solemnly swear that I was never divorced from my said husband, and that I never voluntarily abandoned him during his life, but remained his true, faithful and lawful wife up to the date of his death. I was married to him on the 15th day of July, A. D. 1885, in the county of McLennan in the State of Texas.

My husband, the said J.S. Allen, enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States and he did not desert the Confederate service. I have been a resident of the State of Texas since prior to January 1, A. D. 1910, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value above the sum of \$300.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does anyone hold in trust for my benefit or use, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the value of one thousand dollars, exclusive of the home of the value of not over \$2000; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State of the United States, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

My dear Mr. Sanders:

I have your letter of April 30, 1928, with which you inclosed one, herewith returned, from Mrs. J. R. Wolkewitz, 425 S. Bois'd Arc St., Tyler, Texas, who requests to be furnished with the record of John S. Allen, who is said to have enlisted at Lexington, Texas, in the 1st Texas Company or B. H. Carroll's Company.

The records show that one J. S. Allen (also borne as Jas. S. Allen but not found as John S. Allen) Company I, 17th Texas Infantry, (Allen's Regiment) Confederate States Army, enlisted April 29, _____, at Belton, Bell County, and is satisfactorily accounted for on the muster rolls to February 28, 1864 (latest on file), which shows him present, a private. His age is shown as 32 years. No record of capture, parole, or later record of him has been found. George W. Jones was colonel of the regiment; Jos. Z. Miller, Lieutenant-colonel; one Robert D. Allen was captain of Company A, and one Harvey B. Carroll, also borne as B. H. Carroll, served in Company A.

The records also show that one John S. Allen, who was born in Louisiana, enlisted at Farmington, Grayson County, Texas, and served in Company K, 22d Texas Cavalry, Confederate States Army. His age is shown as 18 years.

It is suggested as a possibility that the names of surviving members of Dr. Carroll's Company who are now drawing pensions may be obtained from the Comptroller, State of Texas, Austin, Texas.

It is proper to add, however, that the collection of Confederate records on file in my office is far from complete and failure to find the name or complete record of any person thereon is by no means conclusive proof that such person did not serve during some period not covered by the records.

I am in receipt of the Application for Confederate Pension of Mrs. Maggie D. Allen, which was returned to this office by Mr. Herbert Smith of this Department.

This application was sworn to by Mrs. Allen before the County Judge of Lincoln County, Oregon. I am sure that under the Texas Statute Mrs. Allen would have the right to make this affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths, but when this is done it becomes the duty of the applicant to show by the certificate of the County Judge of the county of her residence that the officer before whom the proof is made is duly qualified and authorized to administer oaths and take affidavits.

My name is Maggie D. Allen. I am 76 years of age, having been born on February 23, 1852. I am the widow of John Seaburn Allen, also known as J.S. Allen, also known as Jas. S. Allen, a Confederate soldier. My husband, the said J.S. Allen herein referred to, died in November 1867 in McLennan County Texas. I am now a widow and have never re-married since the date of his death. I was born at Waco, Texas and have been a resident of Texas all my life. I now live in Smith County Texas at 425 South Bois D'Arc Street, Tyler, Texas where I have lived for more than eight years.

My husband, the said J.S. Allen as herein above referred to was a soldier in the Confederate Army and as such rendered valuable service to the Confederacy from the time of his enlistment in 1861 until the close of the war. He never deserted the service and was a member of Company I of the 17th Texas Infantry. One of the men who served with my said husband was B.H. Carroll. As I understand and have been told this company was organized in Bell County Texas in 1861.

I am now temporarily located in the State of Oregon where I am on a visit and where I have been for about ~~two~~ months. My home is, as stated at Tyler in Smith County Texas.

I am making application for a Confederate Widow's Pension under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Texas and this affidavit is especially made in compliance and accordance with Article 6211 Revised Statutes of Texas of 1925, as well as under Article 6212 of the same. I attach hereto and make a part hereof, as evidence, a letter of May 2, 1928 and addressed to Hon. Morgan G. Sanders of Texas, which said letter is with reference to my husband's service.
