Darby* respectfully represents that he is a resident citizen of *Smith* County, in the State of Texas, and that he makes this application for the purpose of obtaining a pension under the act passed by the Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Texas, and approved May 12, A. D. 1899, the same being an act entitled "An act to carry into effect the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that aid may be granted to disabled and dependent Confederate soldiers, sailors, and their widows under certain conditions, and to make an appropriation therefor," and I do solemnly swear that the answers I have given to the following questions are true.

- Q. State whether or not you have received any pension or veteran donation land certificate under any previous law, and if you answer in the affirmative state what pension or veteran donation land certificate you have received. Answer *No*

- Q. What real and personal property do you now own, and what is the present value of such property? Give list of such property and value. Answer *I have no personal property*

- Q. What property, and what was the value thereof, have you sold or conveyed within two years prior to the date of application? Answer None
- Q. What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its value? Answer None
- Q. What income, if any, do you receive? Answer None
- Q. Are you in indigent circumstances; that is, are you in actual want, and destitute of property and means of subsistence? Answer Intently dependant upon my own labor
- Q. Are you unable by your labor to earn a support? Answer No Yes
- Q. Have you transferred to others any property of value of any kind for the purpose of becoming a beneficiary under this law? Answer No
- Q. Did you ever desert the Confederacy? Answer No

Replying to your letter of January 4, the records of this office show one John C. Darby drew a Confederate Pension from the State of Texas until his death in 1929 under file number 14414 Smith County, Troup, Texas.

Mr. Darby stated in his application for pension that he was a private in Company I, Young's Regiment of Georgia Cavalry, Confederate States Army. He enlisted in July, 1862 and served about three and one-half years. The exact date of his discharge is not given.

The application for pension of Mr. John C. Darby was approved on the affidavits of witnesses as no record could be found of his service in the office of the Adjutant General, War Department, Washington, D. C.
