Widow's Application for Confederate Pension

THE STATE OF TEXAS,

County of Smith

I, Mrs. Mrs. Laura Ingram do hereby make application to the Comptroller of Public Accounts for a pension, to be granted me under the Act passed by the Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Texas, and approved April 7, A. D. 1913, on the following grounds:

I am the widow of T.J. Ingram deceased, who departed this life on the 5th day of June, A. D. 1927, in the county of Smith in the State of Texas

I have not remarried since the death of my said husband,* and I do solemnly swear that I was never divorced from my said husband, and that I never voluntarily abandoned him during his life, but remained his true, faithful and lawful wife up to the date of his death. I was married to him on the 20th day of February, A. D. 1878, in the county of Smith in the State of Texas *

My husband, the said T.J. Ingram, enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States and he did not desert the Confederate service. I have been a resident of the State of Texas since prior to January 1, A. D. 1910, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value above the sum of \$300.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does anyone hold in trust for my benefit or use, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the value of one thousand dollars, exclusive of the home of the value of not over \$2000; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State of the United States, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

1. What is your age, and date of birth? Born October 7th 1853. Now 75 years of age.
2. Where were you born? Tyler, Smith County Texas.
3. How long have you resided in the State of Texas? All My life for over 75 years.
4. How long have you resided in the county of your present residence? All my life.
5. What is your postoffice address? Flint, Texas.
6. Have you applied for a pension under the Confederate pension law and been rejected? No.

If rejected, state when and where.....

7. Did your husband draw a pension? No. If so, give his file number.....
8. What is your husband's full name? Thomas Jefferson Ingram

9. In what State was your husband's command originally organized? Texas

10. How long did your husband serve? One year If known to you, give date of enlistment and discharge the last year of the war, and was discharged at the close of the war.

11. What was the name or letter of the company, or number of the regiment in which your husband served? If he was transferred from one branch of service to another, give time of transfer, description of command and time of service. (If applicant's husband was a pensioner give his file number, which is evidence sufficient for proof of service.) My husband served in Capt. Rucker's Co. "G" of Jimer-son's Regiment, and which did guard duty at Camp Ford near Tyler, Texas. He was neve transferred from one command to another as far as is known.

12. Name branch of service in which your husband served, whether infantry, cavalry, artillery, or the navy, or if commissioned as an officer by the President, his rank and line of duty, or if detailed for special service, under the law of conscription, the nature of such service, and time of service. See No. 12 above

My husband, the said T.J. Ingram, was a member of the guards stationed at old Camp Ford, near Tyler, Texas. He never applied for a pension because he was not entitled to receive one because he had more property than was exempt to him under the pension laws. The property has now been divided among the children, leaving me eligible for pension.

13. Do you own any property other than that rendered for taxes in your county? If so, state value of same and county where located. No.

14. Have you transferred to another any property of any kind for the purpose of becoming a beneficiary under this law? No.

Wherefore your petitioner prays that her application for a pension may be approved and such other proceedings he had in the premises as required by law.

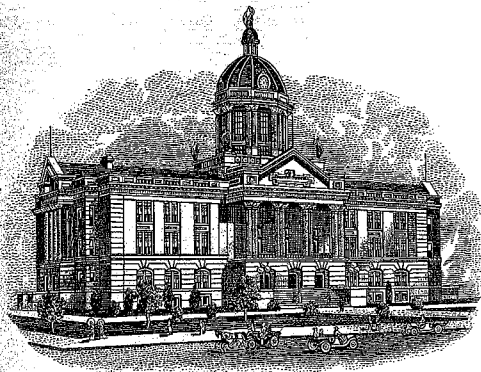

I have your favor of March 8, in which you enclose the application of Mrs. Laura Ingram, for Confederate pension.

In reply to a request to the War Department, Washington, D.C., for the military record of T.J. Ingram, I have the following report:

"The name of T.J. Ingram has not been found on the muster rolls of any organization, State of Texas, C.S. Army.

"Captain Rucker's Co., Jimerson's Regiment has not been identified.

"Several men named Rucker served as Captains in various organizations, State of Texas, C.S. Army.

"The records show that one Tilman Ingram, date & place of enlistment not shown, served in Co. G, 1st. Cav., Texas State Troops (6 mos. 1863-64), C.S.A.

"One Tilman Ingram, who enlisted at Crockett, served in Co. C, 13th Texas Cavalry, C.S.A."

Since this report fails to identify T.J. Ingram as a member of any organization of the State of Texas, Confederate States Army, and since this report fails to identify the Company and Regiment, in which Mrs. Ingram claims her husband rendered service, it will be necessary, before this application may be approved, that Mrs. Ingram make proof of the service of her deceased husband, by the testimony of at least two credible witnesses, who personally know he rendered the service she claims, or the service of this soldier may be strengthened by any documentary or other evidence that she may be able to furnish.

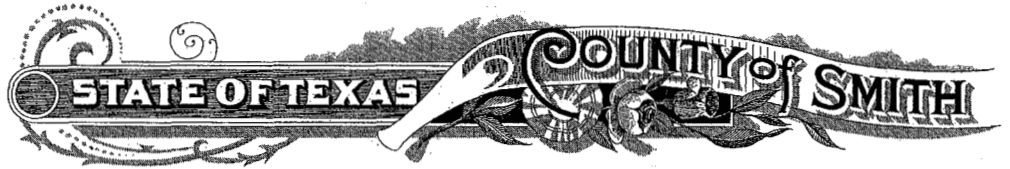
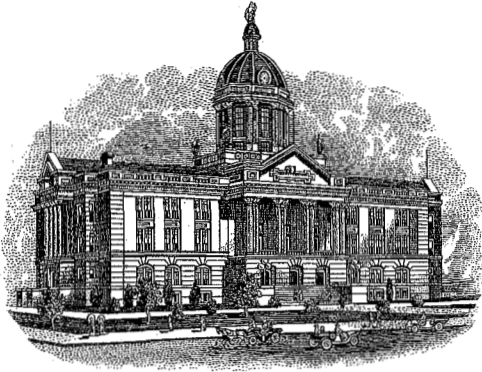
If the proof can be made as required by the Statutes, the application of Mrs. Ingram will have further consideration.
